About Our Speaker

Bob has a Master's Degree in Library Science from the University of Illinois and a certificate in Preservation Administration from Columbia University and has been working in libraries since 1969. Before coming to his present position last spring he was head of the preservation department at the Johns Hopkins University library. Prior to that he was head of the Phased Conservation Section at the Library of Congress. He has studied bookbinding and book conservation and in 1983 set up and ran a statewide series of book repair workshops for the Illinois Cooperative Conservation Program. Bob has presented almost a hundred book repair workshops and has written a manual on the subject that is one of the best available. He has written other books and articles on book conservation and repair and collections conservation. His work in mass deacidification began at Johns Hopkins and that library was the first academic research library to sign a contract for commercial mass deacidification services.

Microclimates: An Overview by Gordon A. Lewis

Microclimates, a new concept in the preservation of paintings, works of art on paper, rare documents, books, and photographs, has been evolving in the conservation community for the past few years. It promises to be one of the most important advances of the decade.

Presently in use by the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the National Gallery of Art, the J. Paul Getty Museum, the Norton Simon Museum, the Woodner Family Collection, and a growing group of major European institutions, microclimates appears to be the single best approach to the preservation of delicate or important works.

Essentially microclimates are sealed, airtight cases. The art is placed into this case and behind the work is a chemical system which holds the interior humidity at a pre-established level according to the individual needs of the work. Holding this established level prevents the expansion and contraction of the piece and the damage associated with continual dimensional change. The front filters ultraviolet radiation and the seal makes the unit both airtight and waterproof. In its high security configuration the microclimate is fire resistant and virtually theft proof. The net result is a solution to most problems which can damage the work whether on display, in storage, or while traveling. Units for frames are 1/4 inch larger than the work itself and can be inserted directly into the frame, allowing the work to appear as a normally framed piece. Several environments are possible including nitrogen and other inert gases



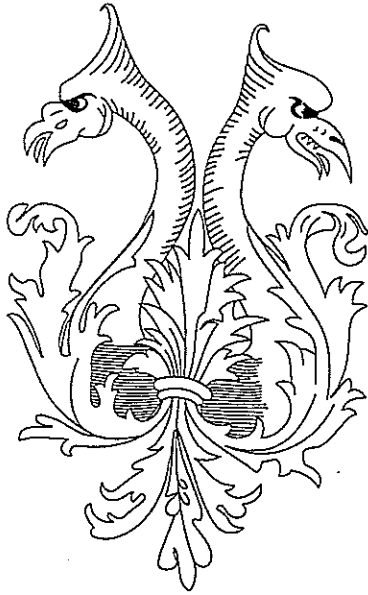
